Brother and Sisters of Local 354,

I hope all enjoyed your summer! As we look forward to the fall and winter months, we should all be interested in what is happening in the National and World political arena and how it directly affects the construction industry. In the last newsletter I mentioned the issues with the supply chain, although we see that it might be getting a bit better there is still problems obtaining equipment and materials in a timely fashion. The price of building material spiked during Covid, these prices have leveled out but still are above the price before the spike. The invasion of Ukraine by Russia still continues and as long as this war goes on we can expect volatility in the markets. Here in the US, we are experiencing challenges with inflation and large amounts of debt, then you throw in the political conflicts between Democrats and Republicans, it is frankly creating a perfect storm.

The Federal Reserve will have to try to limit inflation by increasing rates and by doing so it will create a strain on the economy and the stock markets. No one can predict when we will bounce back from this turmoil, but it is evident we will overcome these obstacles, until that time comes, we must remain patient and hold the course.

I don't want you to think all is doom and gloom in fact there is some good news to report.

A recent Gallop Poll revealed that Labor Unions have reached the highest level of approval since 1965 which means that a lot of people are looking at the trades as a viaible option for employment without spending tens of thousands of dollars for college education and they also see the value in building with Union Craft people.

The Biden administration has invested over \$50 Billion in funds to build semiconductor (chips) here in the US! Known as the CHIPS Act.

Passed the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, included in this act in \$70 Billion for Water Infrastructure, storage and resiliency.

\$15 billion in lead lines replacement \$60 billion in New and emerging Energy Sources

\$10 billion in Carbon Capture sequestration

\$8 billion in Hydrogen Hubs

\$500 million for clean hydrogen manufacturing

\$11 billion in nuclear energy

\$1 billion for Gas distribution projects

There will also be a tremendous amount of work on electric vehicle Plants, electric vehicle battery plants, pharmaceutical plants and data centers adding another 70 billion dollars of work for the UA. If we add in the work that will proceed on sprinkler systems, pipelines and plumbing and HVAC we are looking at over \$800 billion worth of work!!!

President Biden knows that the economy and the markets are taking a hit and what better way to vest in the US, than by funding projects that employ Building Trades members especially the UA. Over the next ten years, we are looking at millions of man-hours for the UA. Although much of this work is not within the jurisdiction of LU 354 and furthermore not a lot in the state of PA, I am hopeful that we might see a Hydrogen Hub or a Carbon Capture Project within the near future and quite possibly in our jurisdiction. The challenge that the UA sees with all of this work is that there is not enough manpower to fulfill the needs of the companies that are building these projects. The UA predicts that we will need an additional 40,000 members to satisfy the manpower requirements on all of these projects!

On the front page, I spoke of the negative changes to the markets. Our Pensions and Health Care Fund just like our personal investments will see a downturn as well. When you study your 354 Pension statement you will see the negative impact this last year has had on your returns, but keep in mind the losses you see are just on paper, you will not actually incur these unless you take money out of your accounts or make trades to other investments within the portfolio. I like to think that right now we continue to purchase shares at a discounted price, as we increase the total number of shares we own we reap the benefits when the market rebounds.

The Health Care Fund is a little different animal, as we are taking money from investments every month to pay our premiums. We continue to invest with money from the man-hours we work every month, we see a shortfall from money coming in, to money going out, which is not uncommon but the last few years profits from the market made up the difference from the shortfalls. Fortunately, the Health Care Fund is very healthy and can absorb this hit and when the market rebounds, we will shore up the fund so that we are prepared for the next time we have to endure an economic downturn such as this one.

Welcome all to Local Union 354!

Over the past few months, I have been speaking with non-union contractors in our territory to increase our contractor base. It is difficult to persuade contractors to see the benefit of organized labor. With that said, over the next few months, I would like to target a few contractors and start an organizing campaign. This involves gathering information, talking to their workers and getting authorization cards signed so we can go to these contractors and tell them that their employees want represented by Local 354.

Last spring, we did COMET classes (Construction Organizing Membership Education Training) for the 4th and 5th year apprentices. In the next few months or possibly after the 1st of the year, I would like to do COMET classes for Journeyman. I think it is important for the membership to understand why we need to organize. We need the help of the membership to increase market share and taking COMET and COMET II would be a good start. If anyone is interested in taking a class, please text or call me. I would like to have an idea how many before we schedule a class.

We have a few signatory contractors that need Service Techs, so if anyone knows a Service Tech who has at least 2 years of field experience and may be interested, please have them contact me. We are always interested in building the MES Service program.

Some of the duties as the Lead Organizer are to work with other organizers across the state, schedule and chair the Pa state organizer meetings, and attend the annual Lead Organizer conference at the UA office.

### **DUES INFORMATION:**

If you are a member of the LU 354 Federal Credit Union and on the Quarter Check Off, dues are taken March, June, September and December and paid 3 months in advance if funds are available.

If you are traveling out of the local's jurisdiction there is no savings coming into your savings account, therefore funds may not be available for Quarterly Check off. You are then responsible to make sure your monthly dues are paid.

#### Constitution of the United Association:

According to SEC 157:

A member owing three (3) months' dues shall automatically be suspended from membership **without notice of any kind**. A suspended member is denied all rights and privileges and is not entitled to any monetary benefits.

Once a reinstatement fee of \$50.00 is owed, that fee plus all dues up to and including the current month must be paid for you to be put back in good standings.

### According to SEC 159:

Any member in arrears for dues for a period of six (6) months shall stand expelled, and must pay all money that he legally owed to the expelling Local Union and pay a new initiation fee to the Local Union in which he will be reinstated.
